Knowledge Translation Program Director Transitioning to New Role - Dave Davis has been named the vice-president for Continuing Health Care Education and Improvement at the Association of American Medical Colleges in Washington DC. In his new role, Dave hopes to encourage and support the transition of US medical school CME divisions to effective, robust, outcomes-focused programs and units, of which the Knowledge Translation Program of the University of Toronto, the Guidelines Advisory Committee for Ontario, and other programs of the Faculty of Medicine are clear examples.

With help primarily from colleagues in the Faculty's Department of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation and its Office of Continuing Education, and with the leadership of then-dean David Naylor, Dave created the initial KTP proposal in 2000 and has led it since its inception. KTP researchers have participated in research projects totaling over 20 million dollars. Now colocated and closely allied with the Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute of St Michael's Hospital, the KTP continues to facilitate rounds, graduate programs and other training activities in knowledge translation. Integrating Public Health Policy, Practice, Evaluation, Surveillance, and Research: The School Health Action Planning and Evaluation System - The Canadian Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute of Canada have charged their Centre for Behavioral Research and Program Evaluation with contributing to the development of the country's systemic capacity to link research, policy, and practice related to population-level interventions. Local data collection and feedback systems are integral to this capacity. Canada's School Health Action Planning and Evaluation System (SHAPES) allows data to be collected from all of a school's students, and

these data are used to produce computer-generated school "health profiles." SHAPES is being used for intervention planning, evaluation, surveillance, and research across Canada.

Introducing the new CIHR Funding Opportunities Database: Over the last two years, CIHR has

made a number of developments to standardize and improve the functionality around presenting CIHR's funding opportunities to the research community. In response to requests to offer more searching and browsing capabilities, the **CIHR Funding Opportunities Database** was developed.

This database will: give researchers and research administrators a search engine to find opportunities of interest and provide more browsing options. In addition to seeing opportunities by CIHR Institute/Portfolio, you will be able to search opportunities by the type of funding opportunity (e.g., Doctoral Research Award, Fellowship, Operating Grant), type of applicant (e.g., Clinicians, Doctoral Students, Researchers), application deadline date, and launch date; allow researchers and research administrators to view a master list of all current funding opportunities; allow researchers and research administrators to browse current and archived funding opportunities by type of funding opportunity, by CIHR Institute, and by type of applicant; provide better integration with ResearchNet features such as e-Submission and e-Review.
