Mimi Divinsky Award 2020 Theme: Artificial intelligence

<u>The Mimi Divinsky Award for History and Narrative in Family Medicine</u> recognizes the best submitted narrative account of experiences in family medicine. It is named in memory of Dr. Mimi Divinsky for her role as a pioneer in narrative medicine in Canada.
