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### Welcome to Dr. David Ponka, the new Director of the Besrour Centre!

We are thrilled to announce Dr. David Ponka will assume the role of Director of the Besrour Centre as of September 4th. David previously served as the Besrour Centre Research Director and the Chair of the Besrour Centre Advisory Council. A family doctor in Ottawa, he is also an associate professor in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Ottawa. David has extensive experience in caring for vulnerable and migrant populations in Canada and abroad in countries such as Haiti, Chad, and Guyana, where he tries to support integrating research into the growing discipline of family medicine. He has served as a medical adviser to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada and is a member of the World Health Organization Collaborating Centre for Knowledge Translation and Health Technology Assessment in Health Equity. David earned his medical degree from McGill University, holds CCFP (EM) and FCFP Special Designations, and has a master of science degree in international primary care from the University of London. He enjoys raising his three young girls to think and act as global citizens.

## **WONCA Africa Regional Conference: June 2019**

The Besrour Centre had the privilege of participating in the 2019 WONCA Africa Regional Conference held in Kampala, Uganda. Canadian and other international Besrour colleagues were among representatives from 32 countries who are committed to delivering peoplecentred primary care in Africa for this event.

This conference highlights important work being done in various African countries. The year 2019 has brought with it a growing interest in universal health coverage in the region, lending the opportunity for the global family medicine community to strengthen its networks and advocacy efforts in this area.



Along with other partner organizations, the Besrour Centre assisted in developing *Kampala Commitment 2019*, a document outlining family doctors' commitment to advocating for universal health coverage and building the capacity of primary health care teams in Africa. ## **African Forum for Primary Health Care**

The Besrour Centre is a supporting organization and member of the newly formed African Forum for Primary Health Care (AFPHC). The AFPHC brings together the leadership of all health workers (family doctors, clinical officers/associates, nurses, midwives, public health professionals, community health workers, and many others) to ensure the entire primary health care team has a voice in primary care policy-making in Africa. ### The Besrour Café

An exciting idea generated at the WONCA Africa conference is the development of the new Besrour Café. The Besrour Café is a proposed online platform that will allow frequent real-time discussions between Canadian and international partners on various topics related to education and training in global family medicine, as identified by stakeholders. Occurring in both official languages of the Besrour Centre, the Café will facilitate regularly scheduled, thematically structured, peer-to-peer discussions to take place between Besrour Forum conferences. Its initial target audience would be early- to mid-stage family medicine teachers, providing a forum for ongoing mentorship, innovation, and collaboration within the global family medicine sphere.

To manage competing time zones and regional interests, the Besrour Café will start as a 12-month pilot program within one region. The WONCA Africa Conference identified many shared challenges and interests within the region related to family medicine education. The creation of the Besrour Café is therefore well timed as a way to follow up on the discussions started at WONCA Africa. A pilot version will be ready for demonstration at FMF in Vancouver this fall.



## Working group updates

#### Medical education and training

The Besrour Centre is exploring a new structure for its Educational Working Group (formerly the Faculty Development and CPD Working Group) over the summer. We would like to get your input so we can make this working group more effective. Our first step will be to refresh our mailing list of partners.

#### Research and quality improvement

- Papers and Research Working Group: Four Besrour papers have been submitted to Canadian Family
   Physician for publication. A scoping review of primary care physician leadership development in low- and
   middle-income countries has also recently been completed by Christine Leung, a master's student at the
   University of Ottawa.
- Narratives and FM Mapping Working Group: The working group has invited colleagues from El Salvador to contribute their story of the development of family medicine in their country to the Narratives site.
- Community Engagement Working Group: This group has met for the first time to discuss the need for a community engagement working group in the Besrour community. Co-leads for the group have been identified—Dr. Ben Langer and Dr. Alain Pavilanis—and they are working to define the group's scope, processes, and outputs. The group is currently working to develop a set of activities for the upcoming Besrour Forum on October 30, 2019.

### **Canadian Medical Association**

The international health department of the Canadian Medical Association (CMA) is working to create a comprehensive network of Canadian physicians who are involved in various global health initiatives. Their goal is to establish synergies between doctors and optimize the delivery of health care on a global scale. ## Mental health in primary care: Research focus

The Besrour research community has began to identify a number of key research opportunities, including in mental health in primary care.

In June 2019 Dr. David Ponka and Ophelia Michaelides assisted in a mental health needs assessment in the Asembo Bay region of western Kenya.

The Besrour Centre and Moi University are providing academic and collaborative support to a community-led mental health initiative that was spearheaded through a









partnership between the Rotary Club of Asembo Bay and HERA Mission (a community development foundation that has been integrated in the area for the past 12 years). The Mwangaza Mental Health Train-the-Trainer Intervention is pilot program for community health volunteers in Asembo Bay that is locally supported, relevant, and scalable. "Mwangaza" is the Swahili word for light.

## **CPD opportunity: Certificate in Local and Global Health Equity**

The <u>Certificate in Local and Global Health Equity Program (September 2019 to August 2020)</u> is now open for registration. Delivered entirely online, this accredited program is designed to provide maximum flexibility and access while simultaneously connecting you with a team of local experts in an interactive and engaging discussion of the challenges in local and global health equity.



- Twelve online modules: This program consists of 12 individual modules covering topics in local and global health equity. The modules will be delivered from **September 2019 to August 2020** and each will be delivered over a **four-week period**.
- Accredited: This one-credit-per-hour Group Learning program meets the certification criteria of the CFPC and
  has been certified by the Office of Professional & Educational Development, Faculty of Medicine, Memorial
  University for up to 48 Mainpro+® credits.
- Completion certificate: Each participant will receive a certificate once all the modules are completed.
- Registration fees: The cost is \$600 for physicians and \$450 for non-physicians.
