Invest in Family Medicine

This election, federal leadership is needed for a **sustainable family physician workforce**.

An improved supply of family physicians will lead to better <u>health</u> <u>outcomes</u>, and a more efficient health care system.

Recommendation

Federal political parties must commit to adding



This can be achieved by:

- → Expanding medical student loan forgiveness
- → Contributing to fair and competitive compensation for family doctors
- → Expediting recognition of internationally educated family physicians
- ➔ Increasing the number of well-supported family medicine training seats



Expand medical student loan forgiveness/deferral

- → Expand currently available loan forgiveness programs to include all comprehensive family practices, with enhanced amounts for rural and remote settings
- → Delay repayment of medical student debts until after completion of residency
- → Make family medicine more financially appealing—earning potential greatly affects the specialty choice



Expedite recognition of internationally trained family physicians

- Fund the proposed CFPC project to streamline and expand the certification process
- → Expand international practice ready assessments and increase family medicine residency spots with necessary infrastructure support

Key Solutions

Fair and competitive compensation

→ Increase the appeal of family medicine by making it more financially feasible—it is currently one of the <u>lowest-earning medical specialties</u>



Fund initiatives that support family physicians and facilitate transition to alternative payment models. Recent <u>physician service</u> <u>agreements</u> have expanded comprehensive care and resulted in notable increases in family doctor supplies (e.g., <u>1,001 family</u> <u>physicians in British Columbia</u> since 2023).

Expand family medicine training and education



Further increase the number of family medicine residency seats ensuring robust training infrastructure

→ Support innovations that increase the appeal of family medicine training, such as the <u>Queen's-Lakeridge Health MD Family Medicine Program</u>—a direct entry family medicine program that combines medical school and a secured transition into family medicine residency training
