Member highlights

* Section members play key roles in Manitoba cancer research program

Two Section of Researchers members are playing key roles on a research team that is addressing the roles of family physicians in colorectal cancer (CRC) screening and follow-up care.

Dr. Alan Katz, Chair of the Section of Researchers' (SofR) Council, and Dr. Jeff Sisler, also a member of the SofR Council, have been involved in the Primary Care Oncology-New Emerging Team (PCO-NET), an interdisciplinary team of researchers under a 5-year grant for teams in primary care oncology research funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR). It is believed that considerable opportunities for impact on the quality of care specific to the provision of screening and follow-up in primary care for CRC exist. The team structure and function was designed to facilitate and support both capacity-building and knowledge translation, and to build on CancerCare Manitoba's (CCMB) two primary care networks: the Urban Primary Care Oncology Network and the Community Cancer Program (rural) to capitalize on their social networks in knowledge exchange, dissemination, and implementation.

Colorectal cancer is the third most commonly diagnosed cancer in Manitoba. Of those who are diagnosed with colorectal cancer in Manitoba on an annual basis (approximately 780), half will die of the disease. The number of new cases of CRC in Manitoba is projected to increase by at least 26.1% by 2025 and prevalence is expected to increase by 52.1% in the same period. While the evidence shows that CRC screening is effective, it is estimated that only about 23% of Manitobans eligible for screening are actually screened; many colorectal cancers are detected late and are by that time incurable.

In addition, the roles of the family physician have been limited to providing advice on cancer prevention and providing limited screening services. However, research into other cancers, such as breast cancer, has shown that study into additional potential roles for family physicians following acute treatment of colorectal cancer, including follow-up care, is warranted.

The grant is entering the last year of its funding and the team has published numerous papers to date.

The Canadian Primary Care Sentinel Surveillance Network (CPCSSN)

The Canadian Primary Care Sentinel Surveillance Network (CPCSSN) is a pan-Canadian initiative that maintains a database of digital information on chronic disease management. CPCSSN works with Sentinels across the country to collect data through 10 different Electronic Medical Records (EMRs) on 8 chronic diseases and neurological conditions (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, depression, diabetes, hypertension, osteoarthritis, Alzheimer disease and related dementias, epilepsy, and Parkinson disease).

This information is intended to be utilized as a resource for monitoring chronic disease in Canada, as well as for primary care research and surveillance initiatives. CPCSSN has been organized as a network of networks. Currently there are 10 Primary Care Research networks participating across 8 provinces: Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia. With strong support from the College of Family Physicians of Canada (CFPC), CPCSSN is partnering with the Public Health Agency of Canada and the Canadian Institute for Health Information. The CFPC has been instrumental in both the support and the development of this network.

CPCSSN aims to collect, in a privacy sensitive manner, de-identified primary care patient health information, for the purpose of on-going surveillance of chronic disease; risk factors, prevalence rates, treatment patterns, and to engage in research through the use of this new and unique Canadian data source that will lead to improved health. The unique expertise developed by the CPCSSN team, a combination of experienced primary care researchers, epidemiologists, and information technology experts, is very timely considering the significant financial investments of the healthcare system in EMRs.

Supported by AMS, Scotiabank, the CFPC and the CFPC's Research and Education Foundation Nominations must be submitted to the Honours and Awards Committee at the CFPC national office by June 8, 2012.

Two awards will be presented to recognize family medicine residents (R1 or R2) for excellent research carried out and completed prior to June 1, 2012. The Chairs and Research Directors of each family medicine residency program will identify the most outstanding research project from their program in 2012. A nomination package will be mailed to the Researchers' Directors in order for them to complete this process.
