The Besrour Forum 2017 is quickly taking shape, and we are excited to confirm the following:

Date: Tuesday, November 7, 2017

(Additional Besrour sessions are scheduled at FMF from Wednesday, November 8, through to

Friday, November 10)

Place: Montreal, Canada

Theme: The Besrour Canadian and international family medicine communities will share, debate, and learn

together to advance family medicine and health equity globally through a range of activities and discussions including: research and quality improvement workshops, feedback on a framework to support ethical international educational partnerships, and plenary and small group discussions about priorities and directions for the Besrour Centre community. Participants will acquire the knowledge and skills to support effective teaching and clinical practice in order to better respond to the needs of

their own patients and communities.

The Besrour Forum 2017 precedes the CFPC's Family Medicine Forum (FMF), taking place November 8 to 11, 2017 in Montreal, Canada. In addition to giving Besrour colleagues the opportunity to participate in both forums, Besrour related sessions will be dispersed throughout the FMF program, promoting and enriching the exchange between the Canadian and global family medicine communities. The Besrour Centre sessions at FMF will culminate in a capstone session on Friday, November 10th, 2017.

New this year, delegates will be able to register online via the FMF online registration portal. In 2017, a registration fee for the Besrour Forum 2017 will be applied, in order to help offset the forum meals and meeting room expenses.

Working group updates

- Narratives Working Group: The group is working toward their presentation scheduled during FMF, on Thursday, November 9th—Besrour Centre Narrative Working Group: Appreciative inquiry and storytelling for mutual understanding.
- Advocacy Working Group: The group has made a submission for a presentation at the <u>Fourth Global Forum on</u>
 <u>Human Resources for Health Building the health workforce of the future</u> (November 13 to 17, 2017, in Dublin,

Ireland), focusing on advancing the health and reproductive rights of women, girls, and children through generalist medicine.

The group is also preparing for its presentation, scheduled during FMF 2017, where it will discuss Canadian family medicine's influence on Canada's international assistance policy. The French presentation will be held Thursday, November 9th, 1:30 to 2:30, and the English on Friday, November 10th, 1:30 to 2:30.

- Ethics Sub-Working Group: The group is working toward disseminating their ethics framework, to be presented at The Besrour Forum 2017.
- Faculty Development Working Group: The group has completed a paper based on the findings from the 2016 Besrour Conference workshop, and will be developing a session for The Besrour Forum in 2017.
- Continuing Medical Education Working Group: The group is developing a template of materials for improving the knowledge and skills of generalist physicians in the local health systems of the low- to middle-income countries, with plans of dissemination at The Besrour Forum 2017.
- Besrour Papers and Research Working Group: This month's Canadian Family Physician features another article in the series of Besrour Papers, "Developing family practice to respond to global health challenges: The Besrour Papers: a series on the state of family medicine in the world."
 - Scientific Sub-Committee: Co-leads Dr. Russell Dawe and Dr. Innocent Besigye wish to thank all those who contributed excellent abstracts for poster presentations for The Besrour Forum 2017. They are excited by what they have received, and look forward to an excellent event! The scientific committee will be responding to these submissions soon.

Fourth Global Forum on Human Resources for Health, Dublin, Ireland, November 13 to 17, 2017

The Besrour Centre has made two submissions to the Fourth Global Forum on Human Resources for Health - Building the health workforce of the future. The Forum is aimed at a diverse audience, including academia, policy-makers, planners, and practitioners across sectors, to discuss and debate innovative approaches for implementing the Global strategy on human resources for health: Workforce 2030 and the United Nations' High-Level Commission on Health Employment and Economic Growth, to achieve universal health coverage and the Sustainable Development

Goals. It is the largest open conference on human resources for health-related issues, with over 1,000 delegates from across the globe expected to attend. The Forum is being organized by the WHO Department of Human Resources for Health.

The Besrour Centre looks forward to contributing to the discussion about global health resource planning, particularly the interdisciplinary training of generalism in communities.
