# Working Group updates

• Faculty Development Working Group

in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, from November 1–4, 2016.

The Faculty Development Working Group is in the process of analyzing data from focus group interviews conducted at Family Medicine Forum 2015. The group hopes to have this process completed within the next 2 months.

• Narrative Working Group

Both of the Narrative Working Group submissions to the WONCA World Conference in Rio have been accepted. The Narrative Working Group will host a Story Booth for examining micro-level appreciative inquiry of individual doctors, as well as a symposium around social accountability at a macro-level of stakeholders in family medicine.

Also, the Narrative Working Group has submitted a narrative paper for potential publication in *Canadian Family Physician*. Second-step verification of the analysis is now underway, and the Narrative Working Group has reached out to their partners for this purpose. They hope to have southern-partner perspectives on the narrative thematic analysis by the end of 2016.

Finally, Dr Christine Gibson and Dr Brian Cornelson are currently working on a separate "roadmap to family medicine" paper.

## • Advocacy, Community Engagement, and Ethics

Under Dr François Couturier's leadership, the group will be preparing a submission to Canada's international assistance review and consultation launched by Marie-Claude Bibeau, Minister of International Development and La Francophonie, on May 18, 2016.

## • Continued Medical Education Working Group

Workshop proposal submitted and accepted for WONCA Rio in November: *"Coordinated, high quality, national continued professional development for family physicians: tips and tricks from around the world"* based on the literature review undertaken by the Working Group.

As well the group as submitted their manuscript to the Education for Primary Care journal special WONCA edition: "Achieving Competencies in Family Medicine through Continuing Professional Development"

# **Current collaborations**

- **Tunisia:** The continuing professional development manual for health care professionals in Tunisia is now complete and will be validated during a 1-week seminar in Tunis at the end of May through the beginning of June.
- Dr Aboi Madaki, a senior Nigerian family physician representing the West African College of Physicians (WACP), visited the CFPC this month. The WACP includes chapters from 15 West African countries including five anglophone, seven francophone, and three Portuguese-speaking countries, making it a natural partner to our bilingual College. Extremely fruitful and engaging meetings were held with the

Besrour Centre staff, with Dr José Pereira (Executive Director of Research), Dr Ric Almond (Interim Executive Director of Academic Family Medicine) and Dr Ivy Oandasan (Director of Education). In addition, Dr Madaki travelled to Montreal (Longueuil) to have meetings with Dr François Couturier, colleagues from Sherbrooke University, and family medicine champions and leaders from the University of Bamako (Mali) who were also in Canada at that time. This last meeting was particularly important, as one of the priorities identified by WACP is to support Cote d'Ivoire in establishing a family medicine training program, a process that stands to benefit from the experience of our Malian colleagues.
