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Dear Members:

We would like to draw your attention to a new and important development within the family medicine research community in Canada. The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) has provided funding to develop a Canadian Primary Care Sentinel Surveillance Network (CPCSSN). CPCSSN has been developed to provide data about chronic disease in Canada. Information about chronic diseases such as hypertension, diabetes, osteoarthritis, COPD, and depression come from data sources that often do not include primary care which is where people with these problems receive most of their medical care. The development of a Canadian primary care surveillance network is an opportunity to collect information on chronic disease that would contribute to the greater understanding of chronic disease that will provide a more accurate and robust picture of the burden of these diseases in the Canadian population. This information will be of use to family doctors, health planners and governments as the prevalence of these disorders increase as our population becomes older. This project has some unique features in that it will initially bring together 7 primary care research networks (PCRNs) who will work exclusively with practices having electronic medical records. Participating PCRNs are:

APBRN - Memorial University Department of Family Medicine **Quebec Network** - UdeMontréal, U. Laval, et U. Sherbrooke les Départements de médecine familiale

CSPC - Queen's University Department of Family Medicine **NORTReN** - University of Toronto Department of Family & Community Medicine

DELPHI - University of Western Ontario Department of Family Medicine

SAPCReN - University of Calgary Department of Family Medicine

AFPRN - Alberta College of Family Physicians & University of Alberta Department of Family Medicine

This 7-month pilot project funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada through the College of Family Physicians of Canada (CFPC) will develop the network including governance, organization, privacy issues and challenges in practice recruitment, disease definition and data capture.

Development of the Canadian Primary Care Sentinel Surveillance Network (CPCSSN): Birtwhistle RV, Lambert-Lanning A, Grava Gubins I, Manca D, Drummond N, Griever M, Stewart M, Godwin M, Lussier M-T, Rosser W.

Background: The CPCSSN is a pilot initiative aimed at testing the feasibility of a national primary care sentinel surveillance system using regionally linked practice networks which use electronic medical records (EMRs). The pilot will be run in seven (7) primary care research networks (PCRNs) within in four provinces [Alberta, Ontario, Quebec, and Newfoundland]. **Objective:** The objectives of this pilot are closely linked to the Public Health Agency of Canada's (PHAC) enhanced surveillance program to increase the use of existing data sources for chronic disease surveillance. The project will develop a governance and organization for existing PCRNs to conduct surveillance for the following chronic diseases: hypertension, diabetes, osteoarthritis, COPD, and depression. **Methods:** This network will provide a robust and accurate data source for chronic disease surveillance over time. In the pilot phase the CPCSSN will develop appropriate standards and policies for patient and physician privacy, ethical recruitment, sample size, data collection, analysis and reports from a pan-Canadian network of primary care practices. CPCSSN will also develop appropriate and secure IT applications for data capture and transfer of EMR chronic disease information to a central data repository for eventual pan-Canadian data analysis. **Expected outcomes:** Establishment of a pan-Canadian sentinel network of primary care practices for the study of chronic disease. Development of partnerships in primary health care between the seven PCRNs engaged in recruiting sentinel practices, The College of Family Physicians of Canada's (CFPC) National Research System (NaReS), and the Canadian Institute of Health Information (CIHI). This collaboration is a clear opportunity to enhance capacity for public health chronic disease surveillance in the settings in which much of the chronic disease care is delivered in Canada and provide new information about the health of Canadians that has not been effectively utilized before.
