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Dear Members

We are thrilled to announce that after a successful 2-year pilot project the College of Family Physicians of Canada (CFPC) has just signed a 5-year agreement with the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) to conduct surveillance on 5 chronic diseases (COPD, depression, diabetes, hypertension, and osteoarthritis) using various EMRs. Family physician offices working within nine (9) local practice-based/primary care research networks (PBRNs/PCRNs) across Canada form the Canadian Primary Care Sentinel Surveillance Network (CPCSSN). Data extracted from participating sentinel practices is de-indentified, standardized, and transferred to a national central repository at Queen's University where analysis is conducted in collaboration with the Canadian Institute for Health Information (CIHI). CPCSSN fully expects further studies to focus on additional primary health care indicators as it expands across the country in this joint public health and primary health care initiative. The project, chaired by Dr. Rick Birtwhistle, Director of the Centre for Studies in Primary Care at Queen's University and managed by Anita Lambert Lanning, Research Information Coordinator of the CFPC's National Research System (NaReS), is Canada's first multi-disease electronic surveillance system.

Currently participating regional primary care practice-based research networks (PCPBRNs) include: the Centre for Studies in Primary Care (Queen's University); the Alberta Family Practice Research Network (University of Alberta); the Atlantic Practice Based Research Network (Memorial University, Newfoundland); the Maritime Family Practice Research Network (Dalhousie University); the DELPHI (Deliver Primary Healthcare Information) Project (University of Western Ontario); the North Toronto Research Network (University of Toronto); Q-net - CSSSL site (Université de Montréal); the Manitoba Primary Care Research Network (University of Manitoba); and the Southern Alberta Primary Care Research Network (University of Calgary).

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WONCA 15-by-2015 Petition

WONCA (the World Conference of Family Doctors) is hoping to get 1000 signatures from the NAPCRG and primary health care community in support of its 15-by-2015 petition. WONCA suggests "that by 2015, 15% of the budgets of vertical disease-oriented programmes be invested in strengthening well-coordinated, integrated local primary healthcare systems and that this percentage would increase over time."

WONCA says the majority of the health funding to developing countries goes towards disease-specific projects (vertical

programming) rather than addressing a broader range of health problems through comprehensive primary health care (horizontal programming).

WONCA suggests that this **type of funding** has limited effectiveness and contributes to the weakening of primary health care systems in countries receiving such aid. To sign the petition, **go here**.

NAPCRG is working with WONCA to change the perception of primary health care delivery and research. The NAPCRG community is creating more and more knowledge guided by patients and their needs, using innovative new methods of enquiry and governed by the principles of science. WONCA is advocating at the highest levels for the place of family doctors in contributing to effective primary health care delivery.

The CIHR Institute of Aging Age+ Prize recognizes excellence in research on aging carried out by emerging Canadian scholars and the resulting publications. Awards are for graduate students, postdoctoral fellows and residents from all disciplines, conducting research in aging. The award is valued at \$1,000.

Travel Awards

Deadline for Applications: July 15, October 15

Through the **travel awards** for trainees the Canadian Institutes of Health Research - Institute of Aging (CIHR-IA) seeks to encourage networking and exchange of ideas among emerging scholars working within the CIHR-IA **priority research topics**. In particular, CIHR-IA would like to encourage interdisciplinary dialogue and cross-disciplinary exposure of research on aging and seniors' issues. This could be accomplished through the participation of trainees in aging at academic meetings of related disciplines, or participation of currently unaffiliated researchers (i.e. outside the field of aging) in conferences, meetings and symposia on aging. To meet these ends, CIHR-IA provides travel awards for Master's and Doctoral students, and Fellows to present their own research at a conference, workshop or symposium.

Recognition Prize in Research in Aging

The Canadian Institutes of Health Research Institute of Aging (CIHR IA) Recognition Prize in Research in Aging consists of a supplement to the research allowance component of the Doctoral Research, Fellowship and New Investigator Awards. These supplements are given to the highest ranking candidate conducting research on aging within each of the above CIHR Research Personnel Awards competitions. No specific application is required for this prize.

Réjean Hébert Prize in Geriatric Research

<u>CIHR IA Réjean Hébert Prize in Geriatric Research</u>: This prize is awarded for the best scientific presentation by a Medical Resident in a core (or primary) residency training program at the Canadian Geriatric Society Annual Scientific Meeting.
